... a search for (environmental) regulatory and enforcement:

- competence; and
- > confidence



What I did with it ...

'Why' - I looked for answers?

> Work through the 5Ws and 1H of 'Working Together':

| identify who | you might need to, want to, benefit from working with |
|-----------------------|---|
| determine <i>what</i> | the main or sub-focus of working together might be |
| decide <i>where</i> | working together might occur or be coordinated from |
| agree <i>when</i> | to start, pause, and stop working together |
| establish why | working together is appropriate and beneficial |
| discuss <i>how</i> | i.e. networking, coordination, cooperating, collaborating |
